THE NEW NORMAL - FROM BLACKBOARD TO DASHBOARD



When we began the year 2020, none of us could have ever imagined that our schools would be closed in response to a world-wide Pandemic. The sudden and unprecedent shutting down of school due to the Covid - 19 Pandemic, has forced educators to face the most rapid and jarring change of perhaps any profession in history. World wide there are currently billions of children in 186 countries affected by school closures due to the pandemic.

Don Bosco High School and Jr. College Naigaon, is located in the suburbs of Mumbai. Financial constraints and improper infrastructural facilities made virtual classes not so easy to access in this locality. These classes are dependent on the internet and infrastructure. The lack of these facilities or frequent disconnection or poor signals at times, are some of the major problems our students have faced here at Naigaon.

Within a short period of time our teachers were ready to meet and overcome these unprecedent challenges. They quickly adapted to distance learning, went through online training programs, mastered new technology platforms and found innovative ways to stay connected with their students, parents and colleagues.

A time table had to be framed wherein the various sections of the school and college would work at different hours, so as to ensure that every student of the institution was able to access and attend the online classes. Thus, the virtual classes are being held structurally, by following a proper timetable which is presided by the school administration.

Teachers began initially by making short learning videos to engage students in the curriculum. However, as time passed by, they got more tech-savvy and found innovative and creative ways of delivering their online classes. They now deliver their lesson through the 'Google Meet', ensuring to the best of their abilities that they maintain a virtual environment that fosters effectiveness, relationship-building and a personal touch that would have otherwise been present in a physical classroom.









A curriculum is planned to meet the needs of the online medium. A syllabus has also been prepared month-wise, to meet the necessary requirements. Each section of the school works to a maximum of 4hrs daily. The time table also includes activity and recreation classes like Yoga, Craft, Drawing, Music, PT and Karate. Teachers are connecting to students, giving lectures, providing study material, conducting tests and activity classes using technological aids. PPT's, Videos and other reference material help students in understanding the topic and make learning easier.

Many students reported that online learning has enabled them to learn independently and has helped them to hold a higher level of accountability for their learning. Online classes have allowed them to do much more reading, writing and discussion at the convenience and comfort of their homes. They can access their classes at any time of the day or night. They have access to their lectures, course material and class discussions. Most parents are seemingly pleased and happy about the online classes. They are relieved that children are academically engaged online. When asked for a feedback on the online classes a parent said, "My kids have become disciplined and productively busy ever since the commencement of the online classes. They are excited as they get to meet their friends and chat with them. They can also complete their assignments and projects at their own pace as there is no stress or time bound schedules, no travelling and no classroom peer pressure now."

At Don Bosco's Naigaon, the Principal Rev. Fr. Anthony Fonseca is keen that students get the best from the online classes. "Integration of technology in education will further accelerate and soon Online Education will become an integral component of school education," he said.

All in all, Online Education has certainly helped our students to overcome the fear of the Pandemic, streamline their thoughts and stabilize their minds. The clever integration of the activity classes and use of technological aids in the delivery of lessons has certainly increased motivation towards learning especially among younger students, making them truly fall in love with learning.







ACTIVITIES – ALL SECTIONS



JUNE 2020

Due to the Covid-19 crisis, teachers found themselves in the situation where they felt compelled to embrace the digital academic experience as the summum bonum of the online teaching-learning process. They underwent training programmes, sessions and seminars that equipped them with the new normal, i.e. 'Online Education'. Online Classes began from 15th June, in full swing.

JULY 2020

Teachers found innovative and creative ways of delivering their online classes. They have turned tech savvy and now deliver their lessons through the Google Meet, ensuring that they maintain a virtual environment that fosters effectiveness, relationship-building and a personal touch that would have otherwise been present in a physical classroom. They are still grappling with new ways of managing this sudden transition, while students are left clinging on to their mobile phones and computer screens. AUGUST 2020

This year celebrations were restricted to ensure that social distancing guidelines are followed. To maintain the same enthusiasm on India's biggest day the school allowed the students to participate in a virtual celebration by



organizing a 'Virtual Assembly' in each class, wherein patriotic speeches, songs and poems were delivered by students. The teachers organised online poem recitation, drawing and colouring competition and other activities to keep students connected and celebrate the occasion.











SEPTEMBER 2020

TEACHER'S DAY

The Covid-19 pandemic might have shaken up the world, but it has certainly not shaken up the love, respect and admiration that our students hold for their beloved teachers. Teacher's Day celebration was made special with a short virtual celebration, through a pre-recorded video. The students showered their love and admiration for their teachers by presenting virtual cards and sending poetic messages to their teachers.

OCTOBER 2020

VIRTUAL SEMINAR

Information and Communications Technology (ICT) can impact student learning when teachers are digitally literate and understand how to integrate it into curriculum. A training programme on the role of educational technology in supporting 'Blended Learning' in the virtual environment for educators and learners was held online. About 60 staff members of our school participated in this online program. The resource person, former South Asia Delegate for Salesian Communications and former director of Tej-Prasarini Mumbai, Rev. Fr. Joaquim Fernandes, highlighted the UNESCO ICT Competency Framework (CFT) for teachers. Father also trained the participants online in Instructional Design and Video Production to create effective and engaging instructional videos for learners. The computer teachers were trained in 'Scratch' a free coding programming language for the online community where one can create interactive stories, games and animations.









In tune with high spirits and hearts filled with gratitude students paid their tribute to the Father of the nation 'Mahatma Gandhi' on the occasion of Gandhi Jayanti. Speeches on the life and works of Gandhi, drawing and colouring of Gandhi Charkha, etc was taken up as activity for the day.





DIWALI CELEBRATION

The festival of lights, 'Diwali', came alive virtually with our young artists enthusiastically participating in various activities and competitions organised for the occasion.







NOVEMBER 2020



TRAINING FOR INSTRUCTIONAL VIDEO

Teachers adopt software to create Educational Instructional Videos. The video editing course was conducted for eight teachers of our school from 19th to 28th November. The course was conducted online through Google Meet by Fr. Maria Sagayaraj, SDB, Former Assistant Director of DBICA, Chennai and facilitated by Fr. Joaquim Fernandes SDB, Former Delegate for Social Communications, BOSCOM, South Asia.



A twenty hour training programme helped the teachers to produce instructional videos and create digital stories for online education during the Covid pandemic. The module of digital video editing program is designed to train teachers in understanding video settings, learning the video editing software interface, learning to edit clips and managing the timeline, working with

imported graphics, using video effects, using greenscreen footage, using the warp stabilizer in audio editing and learning to export videos for social media and mobile for their online education. Mr Ashok Kumar Karvi, Computer Lab Assistant set up the computer laboratory and assisted the teachers during their training programme.



FR. EDDI – GOLDEN JUBILEE An accomplished salesian educator – priest

Fr Edward D'Souza, better known as Eddie, was welcomed into this world by his now deceased parents, Simon and Dorothy D'Souza, in October 1951 at Udyavar, Mangalore, Karnataka. At an early age, having received a good basic education and being well-disciplined, he was sent to Don Bosco Lonavla, where he fostered the dream of becoming a priest, after the heart of Don Bosco.



He entered the novitiate in Yercaud and made his first profession on 24 May 1970. After completing his philosophical studies, he began his first stint as a Practical Trainee at Don Bosco Matunga and within a year, went back to Don Bosco, Tirupattur to complete his B.Sc. degree. He was then sent to Don Bosco Panjim for another year of practical training where he taught Physics and Chemistry. He made his

Perpetual Profession on 24 May 1977. His studies in theology at Kristu Jyoti College, Bangalore, was followed by his priestly ordination at the Shrine of Don Bosco's Madonna, Matunga on 20 December 1980.

His first appointment as a priest was as Administrator at Don Bosco Borivali. Later he was appointed Catechist at Don Bosco Matunga, where he went on to complete his B.Ed. degree. He was then appointed Principal at several Salesian schools where he served with zeal and dedication, earning laurels for these institutions. As a break during his principalship, he was sent to Berkeley University to study Salesian Spirituality.

His dynamism saw him at Fordham University, USA from 2001 to 2004, where he gained specialization in special education. He was then appointed Director of the Don Bosco Youth Services. In addition, he was appointed Director of the Archdiocesan Value Education Centre (AVEC). His efforts helped adopt systems that ensured quality value education in all the schools of the Archdiocese of Bombay.

He was appointed as Vice Rector, Administrator and Registrar at Don Bosco, Kurla from 2009–2013 and in 2014 as Special Education Coordinator in the same house. From 2014–2018 he was appointed Director of the Prafulta Psychological Centre, Nashik. After that, he was appointed Prefect of Studies at St Dominic Savio Boys' Home, Andheri. At present he serves as Administrator at Don Bosco Naigaon.



EDUCATOR PAR EXCELLENCE

Fr Edward's skills as an educator cum academician are noteworthy. Over the years, he has nurtured thousands of youngsters with the heart of a true Salesian educator. His keen interest in attending to the needs of special children has brought joy to many children and parents. He offered them hope to dream and live a good life.

Fr Edward would always ask students where they saw themselves five years down the line, especially after the completion of their school life. His exhortation would be, "Help build a happy family and a happy home; believe in yourself and in God. You need to start working right now, and hard work and honesty will surely lead you to success."

His diligence and follow-up of the boarders at Dominic Savio Boys' Home, Andheri during the last academic year ensured that several of them attained more than 90 percent in their board exams – a remarkable feat!







Fr Edward has always nurtured a special love for students with learning disabilities. His approach in teaching slow learners has included the addition of value-based educational services such as those of adopting different approaches to teaching, having a specifically adapted teaching area, a resource room, or even simply, a separate classroom. These interventions were supervised and designed in several Salesian schools to help individuals with special needs achieve a higher level of self-sufficiency and success which may not have been otherwise possible.



MUSIC LOVER AND BAND CONDUCTOR

Fr Edward is an aficionado of music. His resourcefulness is seen from his collection of music and his being an excellent brass band conductor. His expertise has helped many of his students to be great musicians. The theatre and music productions in several schools, helmed by him over the years, had quality and finesse, and the students learnt to dance, sing, act and





even picked up theatrical nuances from Charles Dickens, Shakespeare, and a host of such greats from the literary world. He went a step further, by teaching the staff and students to critically evaluate the characters and to learn the culture and history of the depicted scenes. He put in special effort to integrate both western and Indian cultural art into the school education set-up. Musicians like Jazzy Joe, the famous saxophonist, were invited to perform while the children danced, sang and acted on stage.



Fr Edward D'Souza will remain in the pages of the history of the Salesian Province of Bombay as one of the most dynamic principals, who worked hard and diligently in several institutions. His innings over the past fifty years will be remembered for character building, inspiring dreams, encouraging confidence, and instilling a love of learning in the lives of the many youth he moulded. God bless Fr Edward D'Souza and may his gold turn to platinum soon!
